When talking to parents, the topic of conversation is often children, particularly children of high school age. Par-



ents complain about their children's spirituality, inadequate school programs, and especially the fact that their children don't go to church! They don't go to church!

The school cannot cultivate a child's spirituality. School can add to spirituality, promote spirituality, and help develop it, but it cannot raise children in the Spirit.

Maybe we have become a little confused. The place where character, family values, and sound principles are instilled, the place where Christ is learned, is in the FAMILY.

It makes no sense to me that it is possible for children under the age of 18 to have so much freedom that they can do what they want. If they don't feel like going to church, they don't go. If they feel like listening to their iPods all day long, they listen.

I fear that we have neglected to give the next generation the solid foundation upon which will their lives will depend.

Worse yet, it seems to me that parents often make excuses for not being able to control their children. Why?

Frequently it appears to me that we have overindulged our children. We have involved them in all kinds of sports, all kinds of activities, and given them so much that there is little quality time left for the family, for conversation, for family meals, for prayer, for each other.

I write this with the sincere intention that all of us think about this situation now, so that it won't be too late or too sad for our children in the days to come.
