# Dear friends,

This weekend we reflect more intensively on a cardinal who during his lifetime was featured on the front pages of



the major world newspapers: Cardinal Alojzije Stepinac, the archbishop of Zagreb, Croatia. Why do we mention him? When Pope John Paul II beatified him in 1998, he said that Cardinal Stepinac was a light in the dark times of Europe, and he served as a guide to the suffering Europeans during the Second World War and afterward during the Communist times.

Cardinal Stepinac, whom we joyfully remember here at St. Jerome's, was the man of prayer, which gave him strength to stand for his principles of justice, love and distinguished good-

Stepinac stood upright against the Communists' faithless regime. He was not afraid. Like others who followed the same principles — El Salvador's Archbishop Oscar Romero, Poland's Cardinal Stefan Wyszynski, South African's idealistic dissident and President Nelson Mandela, the Rev. Martin Luther King — Stepinac was not afraid to seek justice. Like the great Russian dissidents Aleksandr Solzhenitsyn and Andrei Sakharov, Stepinac was ready to give his life for the written truth, to give his life like Mahatma Gandhi, who chose peace in fighting against the powerful. Like Mother Theresa, he could say No to the rich, but Yes to the poor. Like the bishops and priests in China whose names we do not know, but whose underground Catholic Church gives fearless witness, Stepinac gave witness.

Stepinac is a name that stands in the long line of these and many others. We remember him and we pray to him because we want him to be an inspiration to us when we are faced with difficult decisions that could compromise our life, our character and finally our soul. Let us peek into the lives of Stepinac and others whose names are written in the beautiful pages of world history and who can help us when we find ourselves at the crossroads, choosing between good and evil.
