Happy St. Valentine's Day!


Catholic sources tell us that St. Valentine was a holy priest in Rome, who, with St. Marius and his family, assisted the Christian martyrs during the persecution under Roman Emperor Claudius II. He was apprehended, and sent by the emperor to the prefect of Rome, who, on finding that all his enticements to make St. Valentine renounce the Faith were useless, ordered Valentine to be beaten with clubs, and afterward, beheaded, which was executed on February 14, about the year 270. Pope Julius I is said to have built a church near Ponte Mole in St. Valentine's memory. This church was near the gate that is now called "Porta del Popolo," but for many years, due to the Church of St. Valentine, it was called "Porta Valetini." The greatest part of his relics are now in the Church of St. Praxedes. St. Valentine is celebrated as an illustrious martyr in many great liturgical books: in the Sacramentary of St. Gregory; the Roman Missal of Thomasius; in the Calendar of F. Fronto and that of Allatius, in Bede, Usuard, Ado, Notker and all other martyrologies on this day of February 14.

He is the Patron Saint of Love, of Young People, and of Happy Marriages. He is an inspiration to imitate Christ and live a life of love and selfgiving sacrifice.
