WEEKLY MEDITATION for the 15th Sunday in Ordinary Time

You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your being, with all your strength, and with all your mind, and your neighbor as yourself.

We hear these words of life in today's Gospel, and Jesus adds, "Do this and your will live."

A truly wholehearted love of God

is not possible unless we embrace the love of God for us. Then and only then can we begin to love God with all our heart. Embracing God's love is a joyful thing, and because that love is infinite, no matter our age, we can always go deeper into that love.

The last line of these words of life present a different challenge: you shall love your neighbor as yourself. Certainly we try to love our family

and friends and people from our community as we love ourselves. But Jesus chose to illustrate *who* our neighbor is through the story of the mercifully Good Samaritan.

Samaritans were not of the Jewish faith, and the Good Samaritan did not know the stranger he found on the road. Jesus thus makes it clear our neighbors include strangers and people outside our faith.

WISDOM'S CORNER

A neighbor to a stranger

Brendan Caputo, a Knight of Columbus in South Carolina, is a modern day Good Samaritan.

One moming Brendan was walking his dog when he heard a loud crash. As he continued the walk, he heard a moan coming from the area of the crash and knew he had to investigate. He found a man on a boat lift with severe injuries. The man was moving very slowly with both arms hanging at his sides and blood flowing from each sleeve.

Brendan leapt into action. He got the individual to stop moving and helped him down to the ground. He discovered that the injuries were the result of a boat lift that had broken loose and were also quite severe: the lift had broken both the man's arms and nearly severed his left hand. Brendan knew he must act quickly. Using a piece of rope, he applied a tourniquet to stop the bleeding. He tried to call 911 using the injured man's cell phone, but the call failed. Brendan then called home to his wife, who alerted medical help. Brendan continued to provide medical care to the injured man, adjusting the tourniquet and elevating his arms to slow the bleeding until help arrived on the scene and the man was taken to the hospital.

Brendan later visited the man in the hospital, and saw he was recovering well from his injuries. Doctors were able to save the man's hand.

Brendan recalled later a profound feeling that the Lord was at work helping both of them to get through their ordeal.
