



The fig tree in today's Gospel story received another chance to bear fruit before it might be cut down. It was not found wanting because it produced



We, too, have the chance to repent, before it is too late, but



Jesus began his mission with a call to repentance, and today, through the voice of the Church, the same call is addressed to us. We are being called from being self-centered, to love God and to love others as we love ourselves.

Jesus' story of the fig tree contains a warning, indicating to us what we may be missing out on, or lacking. For us to have a deeper, richer, and more authentic relationship with Christ, repentance and bearing fruit are vital parts of the process.

After one particularly long visit from the priest, during which John went to confession, Bob remarked to John, "I know from talking to you that you are quite well educated and intelligent, so I cannot for the life of me understand how you accept a spoon-fed, dictatorial religion in which you must confess your sins, and which insists on interpreting the word of God for you."

John answered, "If you're right that a man must interpret the Bible for himself, then by the same logic you're a fool to be wasting your time in this hospital. There are certainly enough good medical books available to the public for you to analyze your ailment and prescribe your own cure."

The next time the chaplain stopped by, Bob joined them.

Everybody encounters problems in life...problems about himself, family, soci-



ety, job, home, past, present, etc. 'In order to solve our problems we can act so that we just ignore them, or we can openly confront them. The first way is more comfortable, but the second one is more rewarding.' (Pope Benedict XVI)

Problems are challenges. They become tests of our wisdom and readiness for life. Problem-solving demand responsibility toward reality and people. We can close our eyes to them and pretend we don't see them, but then they grow bigger. The problems don't diminish with time. Time never solves problems. Time can heal certain wounds, but it can't solve problems.

I often compare problems to my email. I get so much email every week that if I don't respond within a week's time, they accumulate to the point where there is just not enough time to respond to them.

I believe the same is true with problems. If we don't face them or solve them as soon as possible, they have a tendency to grow bigger. Looking for excuses, denying them, or avoiding them to escape the truth only makes them worse.

Lent is particularly a time for honest encounters with ourselves and the truth we so often avoid. Such an attitude will make us free people. Free indeed...
