WEEKLY MEDITATION for the 3rd Sunday of Ordinary Time

Why wouldn't we?

For the apostle Andrew, faith began by responding to Jesus' invitation "Come after me, and I will make you fishers of men."

Elsewhere in the Gospels it is recorded how Andrew literally brought several people to Jesus — his brother Simon; a boy with five barley loaves and two fish; and some Greeks who had come to Jerusalem to celebrate a feast day.

We ourselves bring others to good restaurants, good auto mechanics, good doctors, good entertainment, etc. Why isn't there more often a similar fervor over inviting and encouraging people to come and participate in church activities? Often we might hesitate to do so because of a false notion that talking about religion is taboo, or that religion is a private matter and shouldn't be shared with others, or that we don't have much of a personal faith to share, or maybe that our worship would not be appealing to others. One of the differences that faith should make in our lives is the desire that others -- especially those without a religious faith -- might also share in and benefit from the relationship God offers us in Jesus.

Called to do some fishing

John McKay, a coach for the University of Southern California Trojans once said that it is not the superstars who win most football games but average players giving their best.

In the play, *Green Pastures*, God asks Gabriel to recruit a leader and Gabriel asks in return, "Do you want the brainiest or do you want the holiest?" God answers, "Get me the holiest. I'll make him the brainiest."

In a little town in the Swiss Alps there is a monument with two figures on it. One is a cultured scientist, the author of many books. The other is a poor Swiss peasant, an Alpine guide. Together they had conquered a great mountain. The scientist's name made all of the newspapers but the monument contains *both* figures because the great scientist could never have made the ascent without the humble guide.

No message is clearer in the New Testament than this one: Christian faith is the celebration of ordinary people who come to possess an extraordinary treasure. When you are asked to serve God in some capacity, don't talk yourself out of a great opportunity by saying, "I'm too old," or "I don't have enough education," or using some other personal putdown. God can give you the ability. What he won't do is force you to be faithful. That must come from within. That is why God always prefers the holiest to the brainiest. The first disciples that Jesus called were ordinary fishermen.

Recently, researchers at Ohio State University examining the state of our youth reached the following

What college-aged youths seem to desire more than anything is boosts to their self-esteem, or praise. They are more concerned with someone praising them than they are concerned with food, drinks, money, meeting with friends, or sex. It is interesting that this desire to be loved and praised exceeds every other desire.

A chief researcher in this study, Professor Brad Bushman, says that it surprised him that the desire for recognition or praise exceeds all the rest. He and his co-authors published these findings in the *Journal of Personality.*

This research raises important questions for us:

Have we become preoccupied with ourselves? Have we spoiled our kids so much that they only think about themselves?

Have we become a society where "I" plays the main part?

To be Christian means to change all of this. I am less important than the rest, and my needs cannot come before the needs of others.

Will we take this research seriously? Or will we simply repeat: I am the best, best, best... say something nice about me... Hmmm.
