WEEKLY MEDITATION for the Solemnity of Christ the King

Christ the King — this feast that marks the end of the liturgical year. Today's Gospel remind us that we need to be prepared to answer "Yes" to the King's six questions. In the parable about the separation of sheep from goats at the Last Judgment, Jesus reminds us to get ready to answer "yes" to His six questions, based on our corporal and spiritual

acts of charity: *"I was hungry, thirsty, naked, a stranger, sick, imprisoned — did you help Me?"*

We are reminded that when we care for the hungry, the thirsty, the stranger, the naked, the sick, the imprisoned, we are actually taking care of Jesus who lives behind the faces of these people. Blessed Mother Teresa explains that they are:

"hungry, not only for bread, but hungry for love; naked not only for clothing, but for human dignity and respect; homeless not only for want of a room of bricks, but homeless because of rejection. This is Christ in distressing disguise."

The sacraments and prayer can make us truly compassionate toward Christ in his distressing disguise.

Holy Land pilgrims walking in His footsteps

Most people know that there are four Gospels: Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. What most people don't know is that there is a "fifth Gospel" as well. That fifth Gospel is the land itself. That land, made sacred by Jesus, which we call the Holy Land. Walking through this land is like reading the Gospel stories all over again, through its rocks and stones, rivers and lakes, hills and valleys, mountains and deserts, towns and villages. This land makes the Gospels come alive in a new way in our minds and in our hearts. When we walk the streets of Jerusalem, when we stand at the shore of the Sea of Galilee, when we wander the streets of Bethlehem, Nazareth or Cana, when we stand on the summit of Mount Tabor, we are able to ponder the great mysteries of the life of Christ more deeply, with greater awe, wonder and understanding. My hope is that, as you read this account of our St. Jerome Parish pilgrimage, your heart too can be touched in some way by our experience. As we, the pilgrims from St. Jerome, allow

these great mysteries to unfold in us in a deeper way, may they also unfold in you more deeply, as you share in our story. May you encounter Jesus as we did.

Tuesday, November 1
Departed Chicago for Tel Aviv, Israel. One group of 28 with Iberia Airlines via Madrid; 20 others with British Airways via London.

Holy Land: Day 1
Wednesday, Nov. 2
Arrived in Tel Aviv around 3:30, we were met at Ben Gurion airport by Fr. David Wathen, our local guide, and by Samir, the representative from Garabedien Tours. We then proceeded to our hotel in Jerusalem: Notre Dame Center, near the "New

Gate" - an entrance into the Christian Quarter. It is an amazing stone building, which is the hotel closest to the walls of the Old City Jerusalem.

Holy Land: Day 2
Thursday, November 3
We began our day on the **Mount of Olives**. First we went to the *Pater Noster Church* (the "Our Father" Church), where Jesus taught His disciples to pray the Our Father. We prayed the Our Father together in Croatian and in English. We spent some time in the garden of the Pater Noster Church, where Fr. David offered some explanations. The walls of the church and courtyard are adorned with 140 large,

colorful, ceramic tile plaques, each of which has the words of the Our Father in a different language. We found the Our Father plaques in English and in Croatian. We are already walking in the footsteps of Jesus. One of the things we immediately learned is

that Jesus was very intentional about everything He did, said, and even where He said it. For example, the reason He taught the Our Father where He did was because it was close to the town of Bethany, which was known to be a place where those who were unclean lived, and as a result they were not permitted to join in the prayers of the Jewish community. So Jesus' teaching was meant to include everyone, both the clean and the unclean. As we walk more, the Gospels become more alive. We read the Gospel passage about this place and this prayer in Luke 11:1-4.

The New Translation of the Mass (6)

What can I do to make the process of change a good one for my parish?

Everyone has a role to play in preparing to use the new translations:

- ◆ Study the new texts with an open heart and an open mind so that you will be ready to use them in the Liturgy.
- ◆ Take advantage of opportunities to learn more about the new texts by reading articles and pamphlets about the new texts.
- ◆ If you are a parent, teach your children the new prayers and help them to understand the changes. Encourage them to participate in the Mass fully and to learn more about their faith.
- ◆ Be very intentional about celebrating the Liturgy each Sunday and holy day. Arrive on time (or even a bit early) and recollect yourself instead of only socializing before Mass. Pray and sing with attentiveness. Stay focused on the action of the Liturgy rather than letting your mind wander. Receive the Sacrament of the Eucharist in great reverence.
- ◆ Finally, give thanks to God in your heart for so great a gift. Times of change are always a challenge. But from this challenge can come a deeper appreciation of who we are as the Body of Christ, gathering to celebrate the Paschal Mystery of the Lord.

The new translation will be entirely in effect next weekend: Nov. 26-27, 2011.

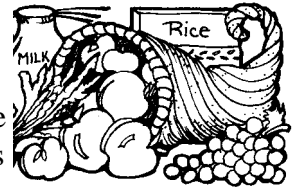
New altar servers being received formally this weekend: Please pray for our new altar servers who are being solemnly admitted to this ministry at the 9:30 and 11 a.m. Masses.
