Advent is also the beginning of a new Church year, and this year the Sunday readings will feature the Gospel of Mark.

Advent begins on the Sunday

closest to St. Andrew's day, Nov. 30, and it continues till Christmas Eve.

The liturgical color of Advent is predominantly purple, though the Third Week of Advent can be rose colored.



The readings from the Bible during Advent focus on the coming of Christ, 2,011 years ago and at the end of time. Advent is a time to renew our efforts to open our hearts to Jesus.

Day 2: Thurs., Nov. 3 Standing together on the Mount of Olives. the city of Jerusalem lies before us as if in the palm of our | much more real. hands. When you come here and sit on this spot, you understand why Jesus wept here. It seems to me I could sit here for days. The Gospel passage that speaks of this event is Luke 19:41-44:

he drew near "As [Jerusalem], he saw the city and wept over it, saying, 'If this day you only knew what makes for peace — but now it is hidden from your eyes. For the days are coming upon you when your enemies will build an embankment against you; they will encircle you and hem you in on all sides. They will smash you to the ground with his disciples across and your children within you, and they will not leave one stone upon another within you because you did not recognize the time of your visitation."" I am speechless. What Jesus prophesied, happened and to this day it is the same. Many still do not recognize him.



the same path. After the Church of Dominus Flevit (Latin for "the Lord wept"), we continue walking down the Palm Sunday road to two sites that are right next to each other.

The first is the Grotto of Betraval. There the Apostles slept while Jesus was in the Garden of Gethsemane, and it was also at this place that Jesus was arrested when Judas betrayed him with a kiss. We stand in the very place which is described in John 18:1-10: "Jesus went out the Kidron valley to where there was a garden, into which he and his disciples entered. Judas his betraver also knew the place. because Jesus had often met there with his disciples. So Judas got a band of soldiers and guards from the chief priests and the Pharisees and went plicity and holiness.



there with lanterns. torches, and weapons. Jesus, knowing everything that was going to happen to him, went out and said to them, 'Whom are you looking for?' They answered him, 'Jesus the Nazorean.' He said to them, 'I AM.' Judas his betraver was also with them. When he said to them, 'I AM,' they turned away and fell to the ground."

Adjacent to the Grotto of Betraval is the Tomb of where Mary, tradition holds that Mary was buried after she "fell asleep," and from where she was assumed into heaven. Many people walk down there, but I personally refuse to go there because the Orthodox priests who maintain the site keep it dirty, dingy and filthy. It's sad because my image of Mary is one of purity, sim-

Our final stop of the morning is to the Garden of Gethsemane, where I celebrated Mass for our group inside the Basilica of the Agony, also known as the Church of All Nations (due to the many na-

tions that contributed financially to its construction). Gethsemane comes from the Hebrew word for "oil press" because the Mount of Olives was full of olive trees, and the olives were pressed to make olive oil. At Mass. we gather around the Rock of Agony, where Jesus suffered his agony in the Garden. After Mass we take our first group picture, in front of the olive grove, in the Garden of Gethsemane. This is a very powerful place to be. We ourselves cannot believe that we stand and kneel at the place where Jesus himself stood and knelt. Interestingly enough, I met Fr. Bernard, a Franciscan from Zagreb who is stationed here. He arrived iust a month and a half ago.
