What we are dealing with are two contrasting attitudes toward the wedding feast. For the wise maidens, it was the chance of a lifetime, a never-to-be-repeated opportunity to meet the Bridegroom. For the foolish ones, it was more like a bit

of fun, a bit of a lark.

The bridesmaids were waiting for the Bridegroom to come so they could accompany him to the wedding feast. Since they didn't know exactly when he would come, all ten had to wait in readiness. Yet five of them couldn't remain ready and found themselves locked outside.

We are like those waiting bridesmaids. We are dealing with some-



thing more precious — the coming of Jesus at the end of time, or the end of our lives. As a lighthouse guides a ship, this vision should guide our way on earth.

Waiting Wisely Works Well

Waiting for the Kingdom of Heaven can be compared to ten young people who all want to hear an extremely popular group about to perform in their town. Five of the young people were foolish, and five were wise.

On the night of the concert they went along thinking they could buy tickets at the door or meet someone who would get them in. Alas, the tickets were gone, and they were turned away at the door. They went away with a sad and empty feeling.

Dear Friends,

Reflecting on wisdom is a good thing. What is wisdom? Many



times we confuse wisdom with intelligence, but they are very different. Many years ago in ancient Greece, Euripides said, "Knowledge is not wisdom." Intelligent people are not always wise, nor are wise people always intelligent. A wise person is one who is aware of themselves. They know who they are! They are aware of who is around them. They are aware of their gifts. They know what they can and cannot do. A wise person listens much. Their words are the product of the quiet reflection in which they observe their world, as well the big and small details of life. A wise person respects his or her experiences. They learn from the past, from history, from their mistakes, and from their stupidities. They have converted their life into a classroom, where they are always learning something new. Wise persons respect their experiences from the past, and eagerly plan and think about the future.

We find ourselves in Bethlehem this weekend, in the very place where Christ was born. Wisdom became humility in this place. Wisdom always carried within itself a great deal of humility. Wise people do not speak as if they are babbling. They do not judge others. They do not gossip. They do not look at themselves as superior. Wise people understand differences, because they understand and recognize talents found in those around them. Wisdom is a person's most important companion. Therefore, wise people always look back and ask themselves questions: What does Christ say about what I am about to do? What does the teacher of wisdom say? What would my grandfather say? What do the times and history say?

The New Translation of the Mass (4)

Will the changes be noticeable?

In the new translation, almost every prayer in the Mass — those spoken by the priest and those spoken by the people — has been retranslated from the Latin to English. Some prayers that we now recite from memory will need to be learned anew, and the prayers of the priest will change as well. In preparing the new translation, the translators were asked to make the English texts more closely capture the original Latin and to use some theological vocabulary that communicates important concepts of the faith. The English that the faithful will hear and pray will be somewhat more complex and formal than everyday conversation. The new translation will use more biblical language and images.

How can I prepare for the changes?

There are many ways in which you can prepare for the changes in the Mass:

- 1. Make a conscious effort to participate more fully in the Mass each Sunday and holy day.
- 2. Take advantage of any special catechetical sessions offered in our parish or diocese.
- 3. Visit www.usccb.org/RomanMissal, and at this web site, study the new texts and to learn more about the changes.
- 4. Read the new texts of the people's parts at Mass. In our church, we have cards in every pew with the people's Mass parts, with the new words printed in bold letters.
- 5. Begin to study the people's parts so that you will be able to pray them well when Advent arrives and we begin using the new words.
- 6. Pray for a renewal of love for the Liturgy in your parish and in the Church.

The new translation will be entirely in effect on the weekend of Nov. 26-27, 2011.
