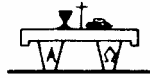

WEEKLY MEDITATION for the 30th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Love of God means putting him first, respecting his name, and keeping his day.

To love God means a dedication of the entire person to his will, placing him first in the mind and the heart, speaking respectfully about him, and keeping his day as one of prayer and true recreation, a day to keep his Law. Love of God transforms lives every

waking moment of the day.

Love of neighbor means respect for others, their relationships, their reputations, and their property. Loving our neighbor as ourselves means looking at and treating others with the respect God gives them. This love begins at home with one's parents. It then extends to others. Love of neighbor extends beyond



our family and friends to strangers, especially to the poor, the sick, and the sinner. Love of neighbor knows no barriers, because God loves even the worst sinner.

WISDOM'S CORNER

See how they love one another...

In the second century AD, a non-Christian named Aristides wrote to the Emperor Hadrian about the Christians.

He said: "Christians love one another. They never fail to help widows; they save orphans from those who would hurt them. If one of them has something, he gives freely to those who have nothing. If they see a stranger, Christians take him home and are as happy as though he were a real brother. They don't consider themselves brothers in the usual sense, but brothers through the Spirit, in God. And if they hear that one of them is in jail or persecuted for professing the name of their Redeemer, they give him all he needs. This is really a new kind of person. There is something divine in them."

No wonder the non-Christians of the first century used tell each other, "See how those Christians love one another."

Dear Friends,

Last week I read an interesting article by Reuters. The articles states the following:

"A 300-year-old ban on heirs to the British throne marrying Roman Catholics will be overturned and discrimination against royal daughters removed under reforms proposed on Wednesday, October 12 by Prime Minister David Cameron. Mr. Cameron has written to the leaders of the 15 other realms who share Queen Elizabeth as their monarch, including the Solomon Islands and the Grenadines, to request their approval, his office said. Mr. Cameron wants to banish laws dating back to 1688 and 1700 designed to ensure a Protestant monarchy and barring anyone in line to the throne from marrying a Roman Catholic unless they relinquished their claim to the crown. Only a Catholic link is barred - there are no restrictions on Jews, Hindus, Muslims or even atheists. The rules have their roots in a turbulent period of English history dating back to Henry VIII's break with Rome that saw Catholics feared as a threat to the security of the state. "This rule is a historical anomaly ... we do not think it can continue to be justified," Mr. Cameron said in his letter."

Poor British. I do feel bad for them. They lecture everybody else in our world, but discrimination, racism, anti-Catholicism is ever-present.

Some of us are still crazy about their royal weddings and glamour!!! Are we blind as well?

PASTOR'S DESK

The New Translation of the Mass (2)

For many people, change does not come easy. Change requires us to stop doing things a certain way in order to do something else. Many people find comfort in familiar routines and known ways of acting. Change interrupts those familiar routines.

But change is also an opportunity to stop and reflect on what we are doing and to come to a better understanding of God, who does not change.

Why does the Church change the Liturgy?

In its Liturgy, the Church always attempts to follow the "norm of the holy Fathers." This effort "requires not only the preservation of what our immediate forebears have handed on to us, but also an understanding and a more profound pondering of the Church's entire past. . . . this broader view allows us to see how the Holy Spirit endows the People of God with a marvelous fidelity in preserving the unalterable deposit of faith, even though there is a very great variety of prayers and rites" (*General Instruction of the Roman Missal*, paragraph #9).

The Liturgy must, therefore, always celebrate and make present the Paschal Sacrifice of Christ—his saving Passion, death, Resurrection, and Ascension. However, over time, it may become necessary to make certain changes, such as adding prayers for recently canonized saints and adding texts that reflect the needs that the People of God wish to bring to God in prayer. The third edition of the *Roman Missal* makes such additions and provides a fresh translation of the Latin texts of the existing content of the *Missal*.
