Weekly Meditation for the 16th Sunday of the Year

It is a consolation for us to know that Jesus too had to cope with interruptions. He too had His plans upset. Today's Gospel tells us that He was in such demand that He and His apostles scarcely had time to eat. However, at some point He decided that enough was enough, and took the apostles off to a quiet place for a break.

However, things didn't work out

as planned. The people followed them. How did Jesus react? Far from getting annoyed, He received the people. He was moved with pity for them. He saw that they were leaderless. The official teachers had no time for the ordinary people, but Jesus had time for them. This is why they flocked to Him.

Caring is never easy. Some people are willing to care a little,

provided they are in the mood and it's not too inconvenient, and doesn't upset their own plans. But to care as Jesus did, when it does upset one's plans—that's the real test.

All of us are capable of caring. The need is great. Neglect is widespread in our society. Many people are like sheep without a shepherd. When we care, we are living the Gospel.

Our Parish History

The Earliest Velika Gospa's

In the beginning, the primary participants in the August 15th procession in honor of Our Lady of Sinj were the members of the Dalmatian Family Society of Our Lady of Sinj. This "Gospa"

Sinjska" society's procession would continue to grow. Over the years, Sveti Nikola Šolta; the Dalmatinska Bratska Sloga; Gospa od Karmela; and the Dalmatinsko Obiteljsko Društvo all would join in the Gospa Sinjska procession. The festival also continued to grow.

The Croatian people always had great devotion to the Blessed Virgin, and August 15th ("Velika Gospa") is her greatest and most sacred day. Accordingly, most Croatians considered it "blasphemous" (as well as "anti-Croatian") to work on August 15th. Many of the early Croatian pioneers suffered significantly at their jobs for not working on August 15th. Those were difficult times for the new and often-exploited immigrants. No matter what the cost, they kept their tradition of setting this day aside to honor Our Lady.

It is not surprising, given this history, that our procession and festival continue to be celebrated on the Holy Day of Our Lady, August 15th, instead of being transferred to a more convenient and thus more profitable weekend day. As long as this festive day primarily honors St. Mary, it needs to remain on her day.

As the Croatian population grew, so did the need for a larger church for St. Jerome Croatian Parish. After 10 years in its small first church at 25th Street and Wentworth, St. Jerome's purchased the present-day church at 2823 S. Princeton from the



Swedish Lutherans in 1922. That same year St. Jerome's Parish School began.

With the new church and school, all of the parish's societies were invited to join the August 15th Velika Gospa procession.

Among the new societies in the procession were: "St. George, patron of Poljica," "St. Jerome Society," "Our Lady of the Rosary," "St. Anthony," "St.

Theresa Altar and Rosary Society," "Children of Mary," "St. Jerome Holy Name Society," "Young Ladies Sodality," "St. Mary of Cres" and St. Jerome's schoolchildren. Years later, the Veterans Post & Auxiliary and the Home School Association would join the procession. (To be continued)

"Year of Sunday Mass" begins this month in the Archdiocese of Chicago

As part of learning and living the Mass more deeply, it helps to contemplate some key words:

QUIET: No one ordinarily stands up at Mass and brashly says, "Quiet down!" The message, however, is right in front of us at Mass. After the proclamation of God's Word, we hear "The Word of the Lord," and it means "Be quiet and take it inside yourself, let it settle within you. Be quiet." After Holy Communion, sitting down amounts to the same message, "Be quiet and realize the one you have received. It is the Lord. Pay attention."

Besides all the music and words that draw us into active participation, the Mass also becomes for us a school of quiet, a place where we learn to quiet ourselves, where we learn to let the deeper things of life and faith settle in, and where we learn to pay attention to God's movement in all of life

THINK: Of course, we pray at Mass. Maybe it's less obvious, but we also **think** at Mass. Thinking means, first of all, perceiving and sensing what's around us. And at

Mass, we are surrounded by decorated spaces, by other people, momentous words, and by the harmonies of music. Thinking also means that we move from perceiving with our senses to understanding with our minds. We come to understand that eternal life and hope have grasped us. Finally, thinking moves us from understanding to making decisions and taking action. We decide we cannot live by bad old habits or other people's expectations. We move freely, that is, with the freedom of the children of God.
