WEEKLY MEDITATION for the Fourth Sunday of Lent

"For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life."

We hear these marvelous words in today's Gospel. They are a good summary of the Gospel, the Good News. It was God who took the first step.

God chose the approach of love, not of domination. God acts

not for his own sake but for our sake. God is not like an absolute monarch who is not happy until he has reduced his subjects to abject obedience. Rather, God is the Father

who is not happy until all his wandering children come home. He desires unforced love.

This passage also shows how all-inclusive is God's love. His



love is not directed at one nation only, nor is it only for the good. It is directed at all nations, to

the children of the light and to children still in the darkness.

It is terrible to reject God's offer of love, but how sweet it is to walk in the light of his love!

A PARADE IN THE 1920s IN THE EYES OF A LITTLE BOY

In 1921, I was born in the house that I am still living in; that is 90 years ago, a half block north of St. Jerome on South Princeton.

As a little boy, I loved to watch parades. Being only about 6 or 7 years of age, I saw that this parade was in progress, passing right in front of my house. So I decided to follow it. The parade went as far as 33rd & Princeton. Well, I was lost. Now, with the help of the good Lord, and angels, I found my way back, by seeing St. Jerome's steeple. —Frank Maione

FIVE GRUICA WOMEN WHO CAME A CENTURY AGO LEFT THEIR MARK

In reflecting on these 100 years of St. Jerome's, I recall the 5 Gruica women who came to America, one after another — "Teta's" we called them. Matija arrived in 1906, Marica in 1912, Jakica in 1912, Andrica in 1918 and Pavica in 1921. They all settled in Bridgeport and made St. Jerome their second home. Weddings, communions, baptisms and funerals were all at St. Jerome. From these 5 pioneer women came 162 descendents. Many of them still consider St. Jerome their home away from home.
