WEEKLY MEDITATION for the 32nd Sunday of Ordinary Time

In today's Gospel reading, Jesus contrasts the external signs of honor sought by the scribes with the humble and sacrificial offering of a poor widow, and he declared that she had found true honor in God's eyes. The poor widows in both the first reading and the Gospel gave away all that they possessed for the glory of God.

Today's Gospel also illustrates why those who held positions of religious power found

Jesus' presence and preaching so disturbing. Jesus' denunciation of the scribes concludes a series of conflicts in



Jerusalem between Jesus and the authorities. We see the widening gulf between Jesus and

the Temple authorities that will ultimately culminate in the Sanhedrin's decision to get rid of Jesus.

St. Jerome's Centennial Pilgrimage to Assisi & Rome, Oct. 8-18, 2012


DAY 2 - Wednesday, Oct. 10 - Assisi

Our guided walking tour takes us to the church of St. Clare, Santa Chiara Chiesa. This church is a memorial to the work of a young woman from Assisi who was inspired by the example of her friend, Francesco. Even though she came from a wealthy and noble family, she gave up everything to start a new life with Christ. Soon after, many of the young women of Assisi and the surrounding area joined her. Her tomb is located in this church. It is a simple stone church with remarkable simplicity and sincere, welcoming feeling.

In a side chapel, on the right side of the church, we kneel and pray and meditate before the San Damiano Cross, the very crucifix that spoke to Francis. After having been on a pilgrimage to Rome, where he begged at the church doors for the poor, Francis had a mystical vision of Jesus Christ in the Church of San Damiano, just outside of Assisi: Christ's image on the San Damiano church's crucifix came alive and said to him three times, "Francis, Francis, go and repair

My house, which, as you see, is falling into ruin." He thought this to mean the ruined church in which he was at that moment praying, and so he sold his horse and some cloth from his father's store, to assist the priest there for this purpose. Christ's deeper meaning, however, was to go and repair Christ's entire Church — not just that building, but rather to renew the Christians. Francis would later understand that this was his mission, and he carried it out.

Peace flows like a river here, silence is powerful. We are open to the same Christ to speak to us. It was a gift

given to us today to pray in front of the same cross that spoke to Francis. This cross was the most sacred thing for Francis. The time spent before this cross was the most sacred time for him.

We continued our walk to one of the gates of the town (6 gates in total) to protect the town from invaders. We walked to the beautiful stone and wood steps down to the bus terminal where our bus takes us to lower Assisi. to the beautiful church of Porziuncula (the name Porziuncola meaning "small portion of land"). This is a tiny church where only about 20 people can fit in, made of stone, intimate, personal, a deeply spiritual place where Francis spent most of his time. This little church was given around 1208 to St. Francis by the Abbot of St. Benedict of Mt. Subasio, on condition of making it the mother house of his religious family. It was in bad condition, lying abandoned in a wood of oak trees. He restored it with his own hands. The interior is austere and sim-

ple. Some of the rough, squared stones, taken from Mount Subasio, were put in place by the saint himself while repairing this little church. It is decorated in a simple Gothic style with frescoes from the 14th and the 15th century. This little church became the home of St. Francis, and soon of his first disciples. In this church St. Francis founded the <u>Order of Friars Minor</u>, and from that moment it has never been abandoned by the friars.

Christ the King, November 25, just before Advent, the new servers will be officially blessed.


