

WEEKLY MEDITATION for the 31st Sunday of Ordinary Time

Today's Gospel reading tells us about the Law of Moses and how Jesus shows us the way to profoundly fulfill that Law. The first five books of the Bible are the books of Moses, and in those books the Rabbis have counted some 613 commandments, including the famous Ten Commandments. A common debate among the experts of the Law was "which is the greatest commandment?" — the same question posed to Jesus by an expert in the Law. Jesus takes two commandments from two different books and elevates them: Love God and love your neighbor as yourself. No Rabbi had previously combined the two. Jesus thus made "love" the defining characteristic of his followers.



St. Jerome's Centennial Pilgrimage to Assisi & Rome, Oct. 8-18, 2012



DAY 2 - Wednesday, Oct. 10 - Assisi

St. Francis had chosen to be buried in the part of the town of Assisi that was known in the Middle Ages as the "hill of hell" — the place that, at that time, was used for public executions. The construction on that site of the Basilica of St. Francis of Assisi was opened in 1228, just two

years after Francis's death, upon the desire of Pope Gregory IX and thanks to the activity of Brother Elias, the vicar of the Franciscan Order who had been chosen by St. Francis himself. Francis was declared a saint ir 1228. Only two years were needed to complete the structure of the lower Basilica and only another six to inaugurate the grander upper Basilica, which is on top of the lower Basilica. The upper church is of Gothic style, luminous and slender dating from 1230-1253. The lower church, however, which one enters passing through a Gothic portal of the 13th century, is low and austere, dating from 1228-1253. In the lower church a crypt was dug in 1818, which houses St. Francis' tomb.

In one part of the Basilica, we find the relics of St. Francis, his original tunic (habit), sandals, cords, the Rule that he himself made for the brothers who would follow his footsteps. It is a quiet, meditative and powerful atmosphere. This is also the room where the Franciscan brothers would gather daily to discuss all the matters of Franciscan life. The Franciscans have always been aware of the presence of St. Francis. Whenever they discussed something of importance it was always in this room. Going to the origins, to the beginnings, to the founding principles, to the founding father Francis was

Francis: kind and generous, patient and smiling. No rush, no problems. We walked through the old stone-paved streets. We came across a fountain, one of so many and then a steep walk up to the church of St. Stephen. We heard church bells ringing nearby, which tradition tells us are the church bells that miraculously rang throughout the night following Francis's death. Our walking tour takes us to the main Town Square. We stop in front of the old Town Hall where in 1206 Francesco took off his clothes and returned them to his father, who had just disinherited him. Next to the Town Hall is what used to be a Roman temple dedicated to the goddess Minerva. Later it became a church. It was interesting to see on the outside wall of the Town Hall the standard measurements set for the construction of buildings, which were established by the authorities to protect the people from unjust builders. We continue to walk across this beautiful Town Square to the house of Francis's mother and father, Pietro Bernardone and Madonna Pica. The original door to their house can still be seen and a church was built on the site. (to be continued...)
