WEEKLY MEDITATION for the Fourth Sunday of Easter

In today's Gospel, Jesus tells the main difference between a good shepherd and a thief of sheep: "A thief comes only to slaughter and destroy; I came so that they might have life and have it more abundantly." Jesus the Good Shepherd wants us, his flock, to have life more abundantly — and these words can be applied to our life on earth, not only to our hope in eternal life.

It is possible to view this present

life on earth as nothing more than a time of trial before eternal life. Although this dimension of trial should never be underestimated, it should not be the only focus of life. Jesus wants us, his sheep, to have life more abundantly — now and in eternity.

It certainly is to be possible to enjoy life here on earth abundantly while being devout



and religious.

However, "to live abundantly" is not the same as "to live it up." To live abundantly is not the same as living selfishly.

Indeed, living abundantly includes an overflowing of the abundance in our lives to others, a sharing of life's goods and joy with our neighbor.

Living life to the full

There is a story from Spain that says when people arrive at the gate of heaven seeking to enter, St. Peter asks them a strange question.

He says to each one, "Tell me this, have you taken advantage of the earthly joys that God in his goodness made available to you while you were on earth?"

If a person replies, "No, I haven't," Peter shakes his head sadly and says, "Alas, my friend, I can't let you in – not yet, at any rate. How can you expect to be ready for the God's heavenly joys if you have not prepared your heart for them by means of God's earthly ones? I will send you back down to earth until you are ready for God's heavenly joys."

The Lord Jesus, the Good Shepherd, wants us to have life abundantly. Let us not be timid and fearful. Let us live joyfully with whatever truly good thing comes to us as a gift from God.

Franciscan Friars: 1209-2009, and beyond...

Continuing our gradual look at the Franciscan Friars as they approach their 800th birthday as a Religious Order, we focus our attention on the life of the man who started it all:

St. Francis of Assisi (1181-1226).

St. Clare's major effect on Francis and his brothers (a continuation)

There is no dispute that the other great saint from Assisi is St. Clare. And just as it is impossible to truly understand any famous married person without considering his or her spouse, so too is it impossible to understand Francis without considering the great woman in his life, Clare.

As noted previously, Clare was a noblewoman in her 18th year, when Francis (7 years her senior) completely impressed her with his embracing of holy poverty and total reliance on God. She soon became



the first woman to follow Francis and his way of humility and poverty, chastity and obedience. Francis saw immediately that he could not have Clare adopt the "itinerant preacher" lifestyle of the Franciscan brothers, who traveled from place to place as preachers, obtaining their basic necessities through manual labor and begging. Instead, Francis placed Clare (and the many women who would follow her lead) into a *cloistered* life — but Clare would see to it that her cloistered life was radically different from any other cloister up until that time. Clare refused to own *any* property — individually or communally. Although many well-meaning church officials tried to convince her to accept endowments to give her sisters financial security, Clare insisted that she would only rely on God's providential care and the begging of Francis's brothers. Clare demanded absolute poverty for herself and her sisters, and her firmness would eventually even persuade Popes to let the Poor Clares live their radical lifestyle.

Why embrace humility and poverty? Because Jesus did, accepting even the humiliation of the Cross. And just as Jesus brought abundant life to the entire world through the Cross, so too did Clare's humble cloistered life of poverty enable her to live on earth abundantly and intimately with Jesus. Francis had a trusted adviser in Clare. She was also a constant reminder to him to find time for mystical contemplative prayer. And because she would live till 1253 — 27 years after Francis — for the earliest generations of Franciscans, Clare was the guardian of the original Franciscan spirit of humble reliance on God.
