# **WEEKLY MEDITATION** — Second Sunday of Easter, Divine Mercy Sunday

Thomas wasn't the only apostle to doubt bearers of the Good News of the Resurrection. Most of them did. The crucifixion of Jesus dealt them a devastating blow. They left everything to follow him, and then he was gone. The value and meaning of everything in their lives was threatened.

The women who saw the Risen Lord in the garden near the Tomb first brought the Good News. And they were doubted by the apostles.

Then the amazing happened — he

himself was once more in their midst. The first thing he did was to show them his wounds. Those wounds helped to identify him as the one who was indeed crucified. Those wounds were the proof of his love for them.

The example of Thomas can be particularly instructive for us. He showed some honesty by not trying to hide his doubts. Doubt can be seen only as a sign of weakness. Yet, doubt can be a stepping stone to a deeper faith and understanding.

The world today is full of doubters and nonbelievers. A major avenue for converting them to belief is if they can "see" Jesus and "touch" him — see and touch him *in his followers*, in us.

Jesus invites us to draw close to him in faith and to look at his wounds. We are called to bear witness to others. A great task for us is to make Christ "visible" in the world. May we deserve to be among those Jesus declared "blessed," "those who have not seen and yet have believed."

# **KEEP the FAITH**

Walter Ciszek, a Polish Jesuit priest, spent fifteen years in forced-labor camp in Siberia. Through all those years he belonged to the lowest brigades, forced to do the dirtiest work — digging foundations by hand, loading and unloading heavy construction materials, crawling in damp, dark mines, where death was only one careless step away.

What kept him going? "Men died in the camps," he says, "especially when they gave up hope. But I trusted in God, and so I never felt without hope. It was not I who kept the faith; it was the faith that kept me."

While Jesus was around, Thomas was as strong as an oak, but when Jesus was crucified, Thomas became a reed bending in the winds of doubt. The truth was (though he didn't realize it at the time) that it was the Master who was the oak. He was a mere sapling growing beside him. When the oak fell, he was defenseless. All of us are shaken by the winds of doubt. We need to look at the Lord's wounds and hear his gentle voice telling us: "Cease doubting and believe." Then, with Thomas, we will bravely and wholeheartedly proclaim: "My Lord and my God!"

# TODAY IS DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY

<u>Please pray the Divine Mercy</u> <u>Chaplet with the Parish at a special</u> <u>3 p.m. prayer service in our church</u>

St. Faustina was canOnized on Divine Mercy Sunday in the Year 2000 by Pope John Paul II.

In 1935, St. Faustina prayed hard for mercy for a certain city that she saw in a vision was about to be punished, but she saw that her prayers were powerless. Sud-



denly she saw the Holy Trinity and felt the power of Jesus' grace within her. At the same time, she found herself pleading with God for mercy with the following words that she heard interiorly:

Eternal Father, I offer Thee the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Thy dearly beloved Son, Our Lord Jesus Christ, in atonement for our sins and those of the whole world.

<u>For the sake of His sorrowful Passion</u>, have mercy on us and on the whole world.

As she continued saying this divinely inspired prayer, the angel in her vision sent to punish the city became helpless and could not carry out the deserved punishment. The next day, as St. Faustina was entering the chapel, she again heard this interior voice, instructing her how to recite these prayers. From then on, she recited the following form of the prayer almost constantly, offering it especially for the dying.

Here is how to pray the Chaplet using Rosary beads:

Make the sign of the cross, and then pray the "Our Father", the "Hail Mary" & the "Apostles' Creed."

On the Rosary's 5 "Our Father" beads, pray the "Eternal Father, I offer..." and on the 50 "Hail Mary" beads pray the "For the sake of His sorrowful Passion..."

Finally, pray 3 times: "Holy God, Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One, have mercy on us and on the whole world."


