WEEKLY MEDITATION — THIRD SUNDAY OF EASTER

Many people pursue illusions. The apostles did. For three years they had pursued the illusion of a glorious Messiah who could not suffer. When Jesus was crucified, that illusion vanished, and their world fell apart. Their immediate reaction was to cut themselves off behind closed doors and live in fear.

It was only when Jesus appeared to them and opened their minds to a new truth that their dream was re-

shaped. He knew what they were feeling and he gave them what they desperately needed. "Peace be with you," he said to them. In receiving his peace, they could take in a new truth.

What was this new truth? It was the revelation that through Christ's suffering and death, he had come into glory. It took some time for the apostles to fully comprehend this, but when they did, they knew that even death had not

succeeded in breaking the bond that had been forged between Christ and themselves over the three years they spent with him.

The Resurrection tells us that Jesus lives. And so, we can encounter him in faith, especially in the breaking of the bread—the Eucharist. He was, is and will be with us. And like the apostles, we too are commissioned to bring that Good News to others.

Could you?

Back when times were simpler, most people followed the same career path followed by their parents. The family farm. The family business. There were fewer options.

But the option of the priesthood was always highly visible for any young man who went to Mass. With the option of priesthood *that* visible among relatively few choices, God's job of calling a young man to the priesthood was made easier.

Today there has been an explosion in the number of visible and intriguing options facing someone whom God is trying to call to the priesthood. We can potentially enter dozens of career paths that our great-grandparents could scarcely have imagined: bio-physicist, webmaster, paralegal, media relations specialist, condo broker, specialists in every field and subfield.

God is faithful to his Church. He continues to call enough young men to the priesthood. But amid the endless possibilities and the deafening activity of modern life, a lot of the young men aren't getting the message. And they are turning old. **And God's vocations are withering on the vine.**

Next Sunday is Good Shepherd Sunday, and it is also the "World Day of Prayer for Vocations." Pray this week for the wisdom to make God's job of calling young men to the priesthood easier, not harder. Pray for those called by God to begin to let go of the selfishness that society teaches us through advertising and through the example of celebrities. Pray for the Holy Spirit to guide you to invite one good young man—a son, a nephew, a grandson—to listen especially hard next weekend whether deep in his heart he is being called by God to seriously consider the generous option of the priesthood.

Is Jesus' message of "Follow me" getting through a bit?

Finding Faith


In 1879 Leo Tolstoy was fifty-one years of age. He had every reason to be satisfied with himself. His two great novels, *War and Peace* and *Anna Karenina* were written. He should have been happy, yet he was feeling miserable. He felt that his life was meaningless. One question haunted him: "Is there any meaning in my life that will not be destroyed by death?"

It was a painful and dangerous time for him. He contemplated suicide. He searched for an answer to his question in every area of human knowledge. He searched persistently, day and night, like a dying man seeking salvation, but he found nothing.

Then he turned to the beliefs of Christians, with which he had been brought up but which he had long since abandoned. These beliefs had repelled him and had seemed meaningless in the mouths of people who led lives in total contradiction to them, but now these same beliefs attracted him and seemed sensible as he noticed people who lived them.

And so it was that he was drawn back into the faith and found it full of meaning. He said: "In the teachings of Jesus I found the purest and most complete doctrine of life. A light shone within me and around me, and this light has not abandoned me since."
