WEEKLY MEDITATION for the First Sunday of Advent

Advent issues a spiritual wake-up call to us, and has an awakening power. Unless we are spiritually awake, we are only half alive. In this respect some people are little better than sleep walkers. They have eyes but do not see, and ears but do not hear. Their minds are narrow and closed. Their hearts have become hardened. To be awake spiritually means to be open to Jesus, receptive, vigilant, and active.

Spirituality is about waking up to

Jesus. It is about understanding seeing, hearing. It is necessary to reflect, to have the will, and to be wide awake. To be spiritually awake means to be attentive to God and to others. It means living in love.

We have two options: we can be a watcher or a sleeper. It is easy to be a sleeper. Much of the world sleeps. But sleepers are wasting their lives. It's harder but very much more rewarding

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to be a watcher. To watch means to be awake, to be alert, to be concerned, to be active, to be interested, to care. Jesus urges us to stay WATCH For awake, to be on our guard, to be on the watch. We have nothing to fear and everything to gain

from answering Advent's wake-up call.

WISDOM'S CORNER

The night is over

One day a wise and learned rabbi asked his pupils, "How can you tell when the night is passed and the day is on its way back again?"

One pupil replied, "When you see an animal in the distance, and you can tell whether it is a sheep or a goat."

Another answered, "When you see a tree in the distance, and you can tell whether it is a fig tree or a peach tree."

"When you can see someone in the distance, and you can tell whether they are a friend or a foe," yet another answered.

There were a number of other such answers, but the rabbi was not at all impressed. Then his students asked him what was his answer. He replied.

"It is when you can look at the face of any human being and see there the face of a brother or sister, because if you cannot do this, then no matter what time it is, for you it is still night."

Franciscan Friars: 1209-2009, and beyond...

Continuing our gradual look at the Franciscan Friars as they approach their 800th birthday as a Religious Order, we focus our attention on the life of the man who started it all:

St. Francis of Assisi (1181-1226).

Young Francis tries to hear God (a continuation)

Francis, 24, was possessed by a yearning for the life of the spirit after seeing the emptiness of the glories of knightly life. After a short period of uncertainty, he began to seek in prayer and solitude to hear what God was calling him to. Francis first sensed that he was called to give up his fancy manner of dressing and his other wasteful ways. He did so. He stopped loving rich things. He began to love the poor.

One day, likely during this time of discernment, while

crossing a vast plain on horseback, Francis unexpectedly drew near a poverty-stricken leper. The sudden appearance of this repulsive sight filled him with disgust and he instinctively retreated into himself, but soon overcoming his instinctive repulsion he dismounted, lovingly embraced the poor human being, and gave him all the money he had.

About the same time Francis made a pilgrimage to Rome. Pained at the miserly offerings he saw at the tomb of St. Peter, he again emptied his purse. Then, as if to put his old fancy-dressing nature to the test, he exchanged clothes with a beggar and stood for the rest of the day fasting among the horde of beggars at the door of the basilica.

Not long after his return to Assisi, while Francis was praying before an ancient crucifix, he miraculously heard a Voice finally answering his search for his calling in life...
