WEEKLY MEDITATION for the Second Sunday of Lent

Each year on the second Sunday of Lent we hear in the Gospel about the *Transfiguration of Jesus*.

Jesus took Peter, James, and John up a mountain and gave them a glimpse at the glory that would follow all of the suffering that he would undergo. His face shone and

his clothes became dazzlingly white. For just one moment, Jesus showed



them what he would look like after his Resurrection.

We tend to focus on repentance and fasting during Lent. We speak about bearing our cross or about the discipline of self-denial. This battle against our selfishness is appropriate, yet we also need to have our

eyes lifted up from time to time. We too need to see Jesus risen in tri-

umph and transformed in glory.

Through his Transfiguration, Jesus wants to also help us see our own future, when we will live with him in glory, no longer weighed down by sin but lifted up by the Holy Spirit.

We are made in the image of God. However, when sin tarnishes that image, we must turn to the Lord for the help we need to transfigure our own lives by the practice of virtue. We are truly at our best when we are good.

WISDOM'S CORNER

Triumph after darkness

All of her life, Sarah had dreamed of becoming great actress. She had worked and studied toward that goal, and at last she had realized her ambition. She scored a dramatic triumph as Lady Macbeth and was hailed as a great actress. Then a devastating illness made her an invalid. For three years she did little except lie in her bed and read. She also wrote poems.

One day her pastor came to visit and found Sarah feeling sorry for herself. He quietly took her Bible from the shelf and opened it to the story of Jacob's vision of a ladder extending into heaven.

Immediately, Sarah saw the parallel to her own life. She saw the darkness, the dream, the awakening, the sunshine, the triumph, the joy. She saw that each step of her suffering and affliction was a step that could bring her nearer to heaven, nearer to God. Almost without effort, she wrote all afternoon. The poem she produced became one of the world's most beloved hymns: "Nearer, My God, to Thee."

"Sin disfigures us; virtue transfigures us."

Franciscan Friars: 1209-2009, and beyond...

Continuing our gradual look at the Franciscan Friars as they approach their 800th birthday as a Religious Order, we focus our attention on the life of the man who started it all:

St. Francis of Assisi (1181-1226).

Francis follows Jesus and suddenly others begin to follow Francis: The first Franciscans (a continuation)

For two years, Francis had been shaping himself to follow Jesus more and more closely. Jesus went from town to town preaching repentance. So did Francis. Jesus cared for the poor, especially lepers. So did Francis. Jesus made Himself poor in the things of earth, focusing on the things of heaven. So did 27-year-old Francis. And just as men followed Jesus, men began to follow Francis.

These were the first Franciscans — 800 years ago. In 2008, worldwide the Franciscan friars number in the tens of thousands, including three Franciscan friars in St. Jerome Parish: Father Joe, Father Ivan and our new deacon, Brother Joe. Clearly many want to follow Francis because Francis followed Jesus so well.

The first man to follow Francis was Bernard (of Quintavalle), a well-to-do resident of the town of Assisi. The second was Peter (of Cattaneo), a well-known cleric in the Cathedral of Assisi. With two followers, Francis faced a dilemma: What was he to do with them? Full of religious enthusiasm and holiness, Francis opened the book of the Gospels three times. Every time it







opened to Jesus' telling His disciples to leave all earthly things behind in order to follow Him. The message was clear to Francis: he took his two followers to the public square of Assisi, where they gave away their possessions to the poor. Then they put on rough habits like the one Francis wore, and they built huts next to Francis's hut near the humble church of St. Mary of the Angels. Soon more would join these first two followers... (To be continued...)
