WEEKLY MEDITATION for the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time

Matthew's Gospel reading today compares the arrival of Jesus on the scene to the coming of a great light to a people who had been living in deep darkness. Jesus was fulfilling the great prophecy of the prophet Isaiah: "The people who sit in darkness have seen a great light..."

In order to truly appreci-



ate light, one must be conscious of one's darkness. and desire to escape from it. Indeed, it is often after people have experienced the darkness of sorrow and disappointment that they finally become sensitive enough to see the Light, the Light of Jesus.

Jesus began his preaching with the enlightening message: "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is close at hand." To repent is to turn away from the darkness in our lives — the sin and uncharitableness that can creep into every person's life. "To repent" includes open ourselves to the kingdom, to accepting Jesus' lordship. We show our repentance by a new way of living, turning from sin, embracing love of God and neighor. And then each of us can bring Christ's light to a darkened world.

WISDOM'S CORNER

Let Christ's Light enter

Mother Teresa gives us a beautiful example of a man who was brought out of darkness into the Light, who is Jesus. One day in Melbourne, Australia, she visited a poor man whom nobody knew existed. The room in which he was living was in a terrible state of untidiness and neglect. There was no light in the room. The man hardly ever opened the blinds. He hadn't a friend in the world.

She started to clean and tidy the room. At first he protested, yet she continued. Under a pile of rubbish she found a beautiful oil lamp, but it was covered with dust. She cleaned and polished it. Then she asked him why he never lit the lamp.

"Why should I light it?" he replied. "No one ever comes to see me. I never see anybody." "Will you promise to light it if one of my sisters comes to see you?" "Yes, if I hear a human voice, I'll light the lamp,"

Two nuns began to visit him on a regular basis and things gradually improved for him. Then one day he told them he would be able to manage on his own, but asked them a favor. "Please tell that first sister who came to see me that the Light she lit in my life is still burning."

Franciscan Friars: 1209-2009, and beyond...

Continuing our gradual look at the Franciscan Friars as they approach their 800th birthday as a Religious Order, we focus our attention on the life of the man who started it all:

St. Francis of Assisi (1181-1226).

Francis rebuilds his life, and 3 churches (a continuation)

In 1205, seeking God's will for him, Francis miraculously heard the Crucifix in the old and broken-down St. Damian's Chapel say to him: "Go, Francis, and repair my house, which as you see is falling into ruin." A year later. at the age of 25, Francis and the broken-down chapel he sought to repair had both undergone major reconstruction. At length, the chapel had been rebuilt by Francis, and in the mean time, he too was being rebuilt — from being a wealthy merchant's glory-seeking son to being a son of Our Father in Heaven, dedicated to the poor so fully that he had given up all things from his earthly father, embracing a life of poverty, going about begging dressed as a hermit, learning to care lovingly for the needs of lepers.

After finishing his repairs on St. Damian's Chapel, Francis moved on to repairing two more churches: St. Peter's and St. Mary of the Angels.

It is worth noting that the great metropolis of Los Angeles would centuries later be named in connection with the humble church of St. Mary of the Angels repaired by Francis. In the mid-1700s, Franciscans originally from Spain named several new mission settlements in California. One mission settlement was named for Francis's St. Mary of the Angels church, in Spanish of course: "Santa Maria de Los Angeles." As this settlement grew and grew, its name would be shortened to "Los Angeles"! Another tiny mission-settlement was named for St. Francis of Assisi: "San Francisco de Asis," which later became the great city of San Francisco. Little did humble Francis

dream of the great impact that the rebuilding of his life would have on the future!
