WEEKLY MEDITATION — Thirteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

In today's Gospel we have two miracles which reveal that Jesus' saving power can overcome sickness and even death. Both the woman with the hemorrhage and the daughter of Jairus were beyond the help of any earthly power. The great faith of the woman and of Jairus is stressed. Both believed that Jesus possessed a supernatural power to heal. These miracles demonstrate the difference faith makes.

Patients who have no faith are at a

disadvantage. They see their illness as something to be endured rather than lived. Their lives are on hold as they wait for things to get back to normal and begin to live again. They are living in the future rather than the present.

Patients with faith are in a much better position. Though faith may not deliver them from their disease or diminish the suffering it causes them, believers continue to live as intensely as before, and even more so. They can seek God in sickness as well as in health, and their sickness can turn out to be a fruitful experience.

We must tap into our spiritual resources in times of crisis. God's love can be experienced in suffering. God's presence does not necessarily take away suffering, but gives us the power to transform it. A painful experience causes us to reflect on our lives, and teaches us to be compassionate. Compassion is not learned without suffering.

Countdown continues: 6 weeks & 2 days till 100th Velika Gospa celebration

Velika Gospa Time Machine ...

... the mid-1900s: Along with the barbecued lamb and barbecued pig at the Velika Gospa festivities (which followed the Assumption Day Procession and Mass), there were numerous other Croatian delicacies.

These **foods and pastries** were prepared by the women of the St. Jerome's **Altar and Rosary Society**. These women cooked for an entire week at the church hall in preparation for the feast day. With the mostaccioli, Dalmatian rizot, sarma, and beef and chicken dinners ready, they began work on the fresh pastries. They turned out strudels, povitica's (walnut cakes), and hundreds of fritula. Their only time away from the kitchen was while walking in the Procession and attending Mass.

Most of these original immigrant Croatian women came from small villages and lacked some skills in the fine art of baking delicate pastries such as those available in cities and big towns. It was Mary Mandich, the President of the Altar and Rosary Society, who organized these women and taught them all the skills needed to bake exquisite strudels and povitica's. For more than 75 years, these women handled the preparation of the dinners and pastries for these eventually famous festivities.
