WEEKLY MEDITATION — Fourteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

In today's Gospel, Jesus pays a visit to his hometown of Nazareth, and he taught in their synagogue. The Bible tells us that many who heard him were astonished, saying, "Where did this man get all this? ... Is not this the carpenter?" They took offense at him. And Jesus made his famous reply: "A prophet is not without honor, except in his native place." He was amazed at their lack of faith.

What happened in Nazareth was a

foretaste of later reactions toward Jesus that would lead to his being crucified.

It is hard to understand the irrational opposition of the people of Nazareth toward Jesus. They had heard nothing but marvelous reports of his wise teaching and his wondrous miracles of healing. One would expect that if they were at all reasonable, they would rejoice on having one of their fellow-citizens admired by thousands and looked upon as the long-awaited Messiah. Instead they

turned against him in bitter jealousy. Why, they asked, should their neighbor Mary's son, a mere carpenter, be given this high esteem while their own sons were evidently passed over? Pride and self-love produced jealousy and envy, closing their hearts and their minds.

It is sobering to remember that pride and self-love can cause ourselves to fall into similar emotional traps that close our hearts and minds to Jesus' revelation of what God wants for and from us.

From Pope Benedict's lips to our ears:

The Vatican recently issued a question-and-answer format book that teaches the truth about Jesus & the Catholic Church.

Question: How is it possible to know God with only the light of human reason?

Answer: Starting from creation, that is from the world and from the human person, through reason alone one can know God with certainty


as the origin and end of the universe,

as the highest good and

as infinite truth and beauty.

Question: Is the light of reason alone sufficient to know the mystery of God?

Answer: In coming to a knowledge of God by the light of reason alone man experiences many difficulties. Indeed, on his own he is unable to enter into the intimacy of the divine mystery. This is why he stands in need of being enlightened by God's revelation, not only about those things that exceed his understanding, but also about those religious and moral truths which of themselves are not beyond the grasp of human reason, so that even in the present condition of the human race, they can be known by all with ease, with firm certainty and with no admixture of error.



WISDOM'S CORNER

Life & death of a friar full of philosophical wisdom

A unique friar in our Croatian Franciscan Custody serving the U.S. and Canada entered Eternity this past week at the age of 89: Father Kvirin Vasili, a true doctor of philosophy.

Fr. Kvirin was born on Feb. 2, 1917 in Medjugorje, Herzegovina (before "Yugoslavia" was created and he outlived that entity). He finished grammar school in Medjugorje and high school in Siroki Brijeg. He entered the Franciscan Order at Humac in 1934. He studied philosophy and theology in Mostar, where he was ordained on June 16, 1940 — he was 66 years a priest! All this early formation was in Herzegovina. Fr. Kvirin went on to study in Vienna and Innsbruck, Austria. At the University of Innsbruck he received his doctorate in philosophy in 1946. That same year he moved to Italy and taught at the seminary for four years. He came to the U.S. in 1950. He would serve at various parishes as an associate pastor (including Chicago's Sacred Heart Parish from 1958 to 1961), would teach at a Franciscan seminary in Westmont, Illinois, would serve as an editor of our Custody's publications and would spend his retirement years with his Franciscan brothers in St. Anthony's Monastery here in Hyde Park (often spending summers in Medjugorje). He was faithful to his Franciscan brothers to the end.

But perhaps the most memorable mark of his life was his legacy as a prolific author of philosophical and theological books. *He would in his day produce a book every year*. He wrote about God and humanity in Croatian, but we can thank a parishioner of St. Jerome's, Duško Čondić, for translating many of Father Kvirin's works into English.

Our dear brother Kvirin died Thursday, after a brief time of hospitalization. He will be waked at St. Anthony's chapel in Hyde Park on Monday, July 10, with prayers at 8 p.m. His funeral will be the next day at St. Anthony's at 10 a.m. May he rest in God's peace.

Velika Gospa Time Machine ...

... 1954: Pope Pius XII proclaimed 1954 a "Marian Year." Since St. Mary's greatest feast is Assumption Day (Velika Gospa) and since Our Lady's Velika Gospa was celebrated and venerated with so much splendor at St. Jerome's, Croatians from all over the Midwest came here on pilgrimage that special Marian Year. It was the largest attendance for Velika Gospa ever!

Pilgrims came from Croatian parishes in Milwaukee and West Allis, Wis., in Pittsburg, Rankin, Ambridge and Millvale, Pa., in East Chicago and Gary, Ind., in St. Louis, Mo. and in Joliet. They were joined by pilgrims from Croatian parishes in Chicago: Sacred Heart, Holy Trinity, Assumption, and Saints Peter and Paul.

His Eminence Samuel Cardinal Stritch, the archbishop of Chicago, attended, and the evening Marian devotions were held outdoors on the parish grounds due to the great numbers. Cardinal Stritch welcomed the pilgrims and preached of the love and devotion of the Croatian people and of St. Jerome Parish toward Our Lady.

For example, if a baby is baptized in a situation where neither the parents nor the Godparents practice the faith, how is the new Christian truly going to learn to *seriously* partake of the faith?

At St. Jerome's we understand how family traditions are entwined with our parish, and we do baptize or marry people who live far from our church; but we need to know that such people who are not our parishioners are active in some other Catholic parish. We cannot give out Sacraments with little chance of a Sacrament being a stepping stone to deepening a relationship between the recipient and Jesus' Church.
