WEEKLY MEDITATION — 10th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Jesus was recognized as a holy man, yet He accepted sinners. Sinners drew the obvious conclusion: because they were acceptable to Him, it meant they were acceptable to God. Jesus distinguished between the sinner and the sin. He condemned the sin but forgave the sinner. His over-riding motive for acting the way He did was one of compassion rather than condemnation and denunciation. He didn't wait for sinners to repent before becoming their friend. No, He befriended them in their sinfulness. This is what scandalized the religious authorities. Jesus' defense was very straightforward: He said He went where the need was greatest. In associating with sinners He wasn't condoning their situation; He was trying to show them a new life. He could not do this without associating with them and being sympathetic towards them. You never improve people by shunning them. In acting the way He did, Jesus revealed the mercy of God towards sinners. If we are sinners — and which of us in not — then Christ loves us not less, but more. It doesn't do us much good to be loved for being perfect. We need to be accepted and loved precisely as sinners. It is in and through our sins that we experience the goodness and mercy of Christ. If we never sinned, we would never know His forgiveness. This is not an excuse for sinning, but it's nice to know that this is how Jesus receives sinners. Sinners bear witness to God's love and mercy. Furthermore, Jesus allowed repentant sinners to serve: Mary Magdalene, Peter, Thomas, Matthew... Jesus saw not only what a person was, but also what he could be.

THE PASSING OF POPE JOHN PAUL II — A PERSONAL REMEMBRANCE (continued)



My final days in Rome preceded the beginning of the conclave that would select our next Pope. By now the streets of Rome were filled with discussion and speculation about the papable cardinals. Everyone had an opinion on who should succeed John Paul II.

Waiters and taxi drivers, bartenders and hotel workers all weighed in on the matter suggesting cardinals from all corners of the world. In the aftermath of the surprisingly large funeral services for John Paul II, everyone agreed on the importance of this conclave for the future of the Church.

With only a few hours left in Rome, I strolled over to the Vatican for one last visit.

The atmosphere was full of anticipation even though the conclave had yet to begin. Travelers filled St. Peter's Square and inside the Basilica long lines of Catholics awaited confessions in their native languages. Men and women spoke of the future and their desire to continue John Paul II's mission of making this world a gentler place.

The realization that a new Pope would now administer the church had finally settled into the minds of many Catholics in Rome and this idea created a sense of excitement in many of the gathered faithful. A new papacy represented an opportunity for many Catholics to rediscover their faith and apply it in ways that improved the lives of those around them. Catholics hoped that a new Pope would be able to further the benevolent efforts that John Paul II had begun. The positive energy surrounding John Paul II's funeral seemed to guide the feelings of everyone in Rome.

As I left Rome I was confident that the College of Cardinals, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, would select a Pope to successfully carry out the mission of the Catholic Church. Arriving in Chicago, my friend John, my brother Matthew, and myself were thankful for the opportunity to travel to Rome that our parents helped to provide. We were proud of the faith our respective parishes had instilled in us from a young age, and we were grateful for the support our friends and neighbors demonstrated on our behalf.

Together we celebrated the selection of Joseph Ratzinger as Benedict XVI and pledged to support his papacy as it sets out to continue the good work of the Catholic Church.
