WEEKLY MEDITATION for Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion

The people who put Christ to death were not a uniquely evil bunch of people. They were ordinary soldiers of the Roman Empire and ordinary people under Roman occupation. In each person, we can glimpse something of ourselves, of our failings, and of our need of God's help.

The trial and execution of Christ was one of those events that reveals the hearts of people because Jesus was such a transparently innocent

person. When he was put on trial, those who turned against him showed their hearts, and so did those who believed in him and stood by him.

When we look at those events, we see some ugly things—Judas' betrayal, the plotting of Christ's death, the hostility of the mob, Pilate's cowardice in the face of that mob, Peter's 3 denials, and the utter brutality of the torture and execution. But we also see some good things—the love of the Blessed Mother,

Veronica's compassion, the women's sympathy, and the loyalty of his disciple John.

Holy Week gives us an opportunity to look at

tunity to look at these events and a chance to resolve to make our ordinary hearts (with God's help) more like Jesus'.

Franciscan Friars: 1209-2009, and beyond...

Continuing our gradual look at the Franciscan Friars as they approach their 800th birthday as a Religious Order, we focus our attention on the life of the man who started it all:

St. Francis of Assisi (1181-1226).



Today is Palm Sunday, and we recall Christ on the Cross. Artists have long tried to capture Francis's love for the Crucified Christ by having Christ reaching out to embrace a humble Francis at the foot of the Cross. May we see how much the Crucified Christ wants to embrace us as well!

Francis & followers return from Rome full of joy (a continuation)

Francis and his 11 fellow Franciscans managed not only to get an audience with the Pope, but they even managed to win the approval of the Pope for their way of life. And not only that! The Pope had so much faith and hope in Francis that he gave Francis and his followers the Church's permission to preach about repentance anywhere in the world! The Pope even had the tops of their heads shaved to mark them as preachers who spoke with the permission of the Church.

These first dozen friars returned from Rome to the Assisi area. They settled into a deserted hut at Rivo Torto in the plain below the city of Assisi. They happily lived there until a peasant riding upon his donkey chose to make that hut his new home and stable. The friars could preach anywhere in the world, but they couldn't be too particular about where they lived, and so they

moved out. After all, Francis called them the "Friars Minor," which can be translated as "Lesser Brothers," or brothers from the lower classes, or simply humble brothers. Given that they were humble brothers, they certainly had to graciously make way for the needs of the peasant and his donkey... (To be Continued...)


Towards Easter
