WEEKLY MEDITATION for the Fifth Sunday of Lent

The Gospel story presents us with a scene which is all too familiar to us—people weeping over the death of a loved one.

When death came for Lazarus, his sisters Martha and Mary were plunged into grief. It is natural and healthy that people should grieve when death robs them of a loved one. Jesus came to them and shared their grief, but he didn't leave it at that.

He challenged them to have faith

in him, saying to them, "I am the resurrection and the life; whoever be-

lieves in me, even if he dies, will live. ... Do you believe this?"

Martha said to him, "Yes, Lord. I have come to believe that you are the Christ, the Son of God, the one who is coming into the world."

It can't have been easy for them to believe, because all the evidence was



against them. Faith isn't easy for us either, especially when death tests our faith. Death

doesn't overwhelm those who believe. What sustains us is our faith in Jesus — who is the resurrection and the life.

Eternal life is not something that begins when we die — it continues when we die, but eternal life begins the moment we hear the voice of Jesus and believe in him.

WISDOM'S CORNER

Death, a part of Life

I believe in death.

- I believe that it is part of life
- I believe that we are born to die, to die that we may live more fully; born to die a little each day to selfishness, to pretense, and to sin.
- I believe that every time we pass from one stage of life to another, something in us dies and something new is born.
- I believe we taste death in moments of loneliness, rejection, sorrow, disappointment, and failure
- I believe that we are dying before our time when we live in bitterness, in hatred, and in isolation.
- I believe that each day we are creating our own death by the way we live.
- Those with faith know that death is not "extinguishing the light"; it is "putting out the lamp because the dawn has come."

Franciscan Friars: 1209-2009, and beyond...

Continuing our gradual look at the Franciscan Friars as they approach their 800th birthday as a Religious Order, we focus our attention on the life of the man who started it all:

St. Francis of Assisi (1181-1226).


Francis & followers have Papal audience (a continuation)

In 1209, Francis and his 11 followers (dressed as the beggars that they were after giving up all their worldly possessions) went to Rome to beg to see the Pope. Francis had some Bible passages he wanted to use as guiding principles, and he wanted the Pope's approval of their way of life so that his new group might always stay close to the Church that Jesus founded on the rock of Peter.

There are differing accounts of Francis's reception by Pope Innocent III. Apparently, the Pope at first somewhat rudely rejected Francis's attempt to meet. It seems, however, that the Bishop of Assisi, Bishop Guido, who was then in Rome, spoke in favor of the rejected Francis to Cardinal John of St. Paul, who then in turn persuaded the Pope to call Francis back for a papal audience. Even so, some Cardinals were highly skeptical that such a radical way of life such as Francis's could lead to a proper Religious Order — they predicted that this total embracing of poverty was unsafe and impractical.

But the Pope recalled a dream that he had had, in which the Pope beheld Francis, the Poor Man of Assisi, upholding a magnificent but

tottering Cathedral of Rome. The Cathedral was actually not physically tottering, but in the dream its shakiness was symbolic of how the human dimension of the Church in Francis's time was in desperate need of repair. (Recall how 4 years earlier, the Crucifix spoke to Francis in a vision, saying: "Go, Francis, and repair My House, which as you see is falling into ruin.") The Pope gave an oral approval to the way of life submitted by Francis and granted the saint and his companions authority to preach repentance everywhere... (To be continued...)


