WEEKLY MEDITATION — Fifth Sunday of Easter

"As I have loved you, so you also should love one another," Jesus tells us in today's Gospel.

Yet, people tend to see the Problem of Love as *being* loved rather than being a loving person. Hence, all their efforts go into making *themselves* loveable (through being successful, or glamorous, or powerful, or rich). Often, they end up without True Love, for they are loved for something they possess, or something they achieved, instead of being truly loved for themselves. On the other hand, if they were

to become loving people, they would be loved for themselves, not for their status, looks, or possessions.

In the end, all of us want to be loved for ourselves. Those who are not loved seek to be admired.

There are three possibilities with True Love: not to love and not to be loved; to love but not to be loved in return; and to love and be loved.

The first condition can be very sad. The second, though painful, is far better than the first. The last state is the blessed state Jesus enjoys and

speaks of in today's Gospel.

Without love what are we? A doctor, who has shared the most profound moments of people's lives says that people facing death don't think about what degrees they have earned, or what positions they have held, or how much wealth they have accumulated. What really matters is who they love.

Love brings out the best in the one who loves. People are at their best when they love. Love is a choice, not a feeling. This is where True Love begins.

A man once planted a fruit tree in a forest. At first the fruit tree felt lost and insignificant in the midst of so many great trees. Soon it set about gaining a place and standing for itself in the forest.
