WEEKLY MEDITATION for the Solemnity of Christ the King

In the judgment scene of today's Gospel, people are condemned, not for sins of commission, but for sins of omission. We may think we are good simply because we don't do any harm to anyone. What about the good we fail to do? This sin of omission can be the worst of sins.

From a Christian point of view, the failure to "love our neighbor as ourselves" is a great sin of omission because it violates one of Christ's two

Great Commandments. Let us not omit using even the little opportunities to love that come our way daily ... opportunities to be friendly, helpful, considerate, cooperative, forgiving.

Too often people experience the ache of realizing that they left undone what they ought to have done.

We never know exactly who we are meeting when we see someone in need of our loving words and actions, but that is not important. What is important is



that we see in that person a human being in need, and that we do our best to meet that need. Those with faith know that the face of Christ lies hidden behind the face of someone in need.

Oscar Wilde wrote a beautiful story about a prince who lived a very sheltered life. When the prince died the people erected a statue of him in the main square of the town. One evening a little bird landed at the base of the statue and noticed the prince crying. He told the bird that he was sad because while he was alive he never knew that there was such suffering in the world.
