WEEKLY MEDITATION — Thirty-first Sunday in Ordinary Time

Failure to love is the great failure in a Christian. Often, however, it is not even seen as a sin. Sin is often only recognized when it means doing harm to a neighbor, but not when it means failing to love, or withholding love.

One great danger facing churchgoers is that they often don't see the connection between what they do in church on Sunday and what they do in relation to their neighbor during the week. People may even examine their conscience but the examination may be incomplete, leaving whole areas untouched.

It's very easy to separate the two great commandments: love God and love your neighbor. However, in a sense, there is only one commandment — the commandment of love. It is like a coin, one entity with two sides. It is impossible to have one without the other.

All of us have a great capacity to love. Sadly, we seem to use it all too seldom.

God is deeply concerned about the way we treat one another. Our vocation is to love. Knowing the two greatest commandments is the first step. Putting them into practice is the second step. Jesus said to the scribe, "You are not far from the kingdom of God." We are not far from the Kingdom — just a step away.

Sr. Mary Bernardine Condich: 'God is good'

Sister Bernardine, 83, a vocation from our parish, was called to her eternal home on the Feast of All Saints, Nov. 1. She was a professed Adorer of the Blood of Christ for 66 years!

She was born June 24, 1923 in Chicago and baptized as Dorothy Jaka at St. Jerome Croatian Parish. Her hardworking, faith-filled and devout parents, Marko & Antonia (née Utobičić) Condich, had emigrated from Croatia to Chicago, where they raised a family of five boys (John, Joseph, Mark, Peter and Simon Duško) and three girls (Sr. Bernardine, Evelyn and Rosanda). All the children attended St. Jerome's school, which was staffed by the Adorers of the Blood of Christ. It was during her grade school years—inspired by God and the example of the Sisters—that Dorothy Jaka experienced the call to become a Religious Sister.

At the age of 15, she traveled by train to Columbia, Pennsylvania to be with the Sisters. At 16, she was received into the Community and was given the name Sister Mary Bernardine. She professed her final vows for life in 1945, at age 22.

She taught kindergarten in South Carolina, ministered as a cook and baker, and dedicated herself to the care of her retired and sick Religious Sisters. Her driving assignments made her a widely known witness of Christian friendliness to many in the Columbia/Lancaster area. She read avidly, loved nature and enjoyed gardening. She was a prayerful woman, a great lover of the Mass and of the Blessed Sacrament, spending many hours in adoration and quiet prayer. A favorite saying of hers was: "God is good."

May she rest in peace!

Rather than spend hours trying to convince one person to vote the right way, spend that time and energy reminding dozens of people—who are already in agreement with you on the issues—to get out and cast their vote. Don't go looking for the Personal Victory of catching the "hard to get" voter. Go catch the easier ones and bring the candidate to victory.
