WEEKLY MEDITATION for the Solemnity of Christ the King

Jesus is indeed a king, but not the usual sort of king.


He came not to conquer armies, but to convert hearts; not to sinfully dominate but to liberate from sin; not to proudly rule but to humbly serve. He died crucified like a criminal, yet he reigned as king from the cross. He responded to the worst in us with what was best in him.

On the cross, Jesus endured insults and mockery, yet his heart remained open, even to his enemies. He

absorbed all the violence, transformed it, and returned it as love and forgiveness.

All of the time when we suffer pain, pain can easily turn into rage, causing us to lash out blindly at whomever happens to be within range.

But from the depths of his own pain Jesus reached out to comfort the repentant thief who was crucified next



to him. Some people are like sugar cane — when crushed in the mill, what they yield is sweetness.

Jesus stretches our capacity for compassion. He challenges our idea of love. Each of us has a great capacity for love.

The pity is that it often goes unused. By our love, people will know that we are followers of Christ the King.

Stumbling block or stepping stone?

Once, two travelers were going through a forest when night came upon them. In a matter of minutes, the narrow path that they had been following became invisible. In the darkness, terror lurked everywhere. To make matters worse, a violent thunderstorm broke over the forest.

Franciscan Friars: 1209-2009, and beyond...

Continuing our gradual look at the Franciscan Friars as they approach their 800th birthday as a Religious Order, we focus our attention on the man who started it all:

St. Francis of Assisi (1181-1226).

The low fever that Francis contracted while a prisoner of war opened his eyes a bit to the emptiness of a life focused on knightly glory. With returning health, however, Francis's eagerness after glory reawakened and his fancy wandered in search of victories; at length he resolved to embrace a military career, and circumstances seemed to favor his aspirations. A knight of Assisi was about to go off to battle, and Francis arranged to accompany him.

Francis's biographers tell us that the night before he set forth, Francis had a strange dream, in which he saw a vast hall hung with armor all marked with the Cross. "These," said a Voice, "are for you and your soldiers."

Because of this dream, Francis exclaimed: "I know I shall be a great prince!" And he departed with the knight of Assisi to do battle in Apulia. But a second illness arrested his course at Spoleto. There, we are told, Francis had another dream in which the same Voice told him to return back to Assisi. He did so at once. Francis was 24.

Although Francis still joined at times in the noisy celebrating of his former comrades, his changed demeanor plainly showed that his heart was no longer with them; a yearning for the life of the spirit had already possessed it.
