WEEKLY MEDITATION for the 29th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Jesus told his disciples (and says to us): Pray continually and never lose heart. Some people do not see the value of *committing* to regular prayer. They think it is enough to pray when they feel the urge to do so.

If we stop praying, we are likely to lose heart and give up. To pray means to put oneself and one's destiny in the hands of God. To pray means to rely on God's strength and not merely on our own. When we pray, another kind of power becomes available to us.



A prayer is answered not when we get what we are asking for, but when God offers us what God wants to give us. Sometimes we are deaf to God's offer. Through persistent

prayer, we open our heart and can sense God's nearness. Prayer may not change the world for us, but it does offer us the strength to face the world.

When we learn how to pray we

learn not just how to recite words, but how to open the heart, how to unclog our hearts from sin. Quiet prayer of the heart is very nourishing. Just sitting quietly, rejecting sin, opening the heart, letting God in. Prayer is important. It clarifies our hopes and our intentions. It helps us to discern between good and evil, and the important and the trivial, but it is no substitute for action, and it is not an escape from life. Its main purpose is to foster our relationship with God — and that is reward in itself!

WISDOM'S CORNER The Role of Prayer

Three men were trapped in a dark cellar that had no doors or windows. How did they react to their predicament?

The first man had no faith, so he just sat there cursing the darkness, resigning himself to what he thought would be his fate-death.

The second man was very religious, so he prayed for a long time, then sat back and waited for a miracle.

The third man was guite religious in his own way, but he was also very practical. He was a bricklaver and realized he had a small chisel in his pocket. With the light of a match he found a small stone and used it as a hammer to chip away at the wall.

The work was slow, monotonous, and exhausting. Neither of the other two men offered to help. From time to time as the man chipped away, he prayed to God for help. Finally, after hours of painful work, a big stone dislodged itself and light streamed in from next door. Then his two companions helped him to widen the hole so that all three could crawl to freedom.

For the first man, prayer was a waste of time. For the second, prayer was a substitute for action. Only the third man believed in prayer as a spur to action. His prayers sustained his action.

Franciscan Friars: 1209-2009, and beyond...

Continuing our look at the Franciscan Friars as they approach their 800th birthday as a Religious Order, it is good to clarify what's the difference between Franciscan priests. like our Fr. Joe and Fr. Ivan, and diocesan priests, like our good neighbors Fr. Brandt of Nativity and Fr. Parker of All Saints/St. Anthony.

According to Roman Catholic Church Law, every priest must belong either to a diocese (which is a geographical region, like the Chicago diocese) or to a Religious Order, like the Franciscans, Dominicans, Jesuits and Benedictines.

Diocesan priests belong to the bishop of their diocese. So, the diocesan priests of Chicago belong to Cardinal George.

Religious Order priests belong to a "family" of followers of some saintly person (or persons) who founded their Religious Order "family." The Franciscan Friar "family" was founded in 1209 by saintly Francis (of Assisi, Italy); the Dominican "family" was founded by saintly Dominic (of Spain); the Jesuit "family" by saintly Ignatius of Loyola (of Spain); the Benedictines were founded by the saintly siblings Benedict and Scholastica (of Italy).

There are many differences between the vows and promises of diocesan priests and Religious Order priests - for example, Franciscans have a vow of poverty, while diocesan priests are permitted to own property.

There are also many differences between one Religious Order and another: Dominicans are often great preachers, Jesuits are often university professors, Benedictines are often monks who pray together, and Franciscans are often close to the people they serve, especially the poor.

Finally, within the Franciscan Friars, not all Friars are priests. "Friar" means "Brother." It doesn't mean "Priest." So a goodly number of Franciscan Friars will never be ordained as priests. These non-ordained brothers serve God in many ways: as teachers, charitable workers, cooks, technicians, gardeners, fundraisers, doorkeepers and administrators, to name a few of the many jobs done by non-ordained Franciscan Friars.
