WEEKLY MEDITATION—Third Sunday in Ordinary Time

Peter, Andrew, James and John were ordinary fishermen, yet they left everything and followed Jesus. It wasn't that they were fed up with fishing. It was that they knew Jesus was calling them to do something more worthwhile with their lives. The Lord still calls people today and the need is just as great today as it was during the time of the Apostles. One doesn't have to be an exceptional person to be a disciple of Jesus. No one believed in the ordinary people as much as Jesus. Some people are called to dedicate themselves totally to the following of Christ, but not all Christians are called to follow Christ this way.

What does following Christ mean for the ordinary person? It means to be a Christian right where you are, where you live, where you work. This call of Christ to follow him is always an invitation and it always offers us an opportunity to live a fuller and more worthwhile life. However, the idea of a call runs counter the prevailing culture. The thinking today is that we can live an uncalled life – one uncommitted to any purpose beyond oneself. It's not easy to allow oneself to be chosen, or to answer Christ's call, but he provides all the help we need, and there are many ways of serving him.

47 million human beings, Rest in Peace

On Monday, it will be 33 years since the U.S. Supreme Court struck down state laws protecting the unborn from abortion. The "*Roe versus Wade*" decision was handed down Jan. 23, 1973. Since then, at least 47 million Americans have had their lives aborted.

After 33 years of abortion on demand being legal, much of the natural sense of shock and horror at this enormous destruction of human life has been de-sensitized.

How can we wake up from numbness and apathy? How can we <u>do</u> something <u>good</u> to overcome silence and indifference toward this tragedy?

Some of the apathy comes from an underlying materialistic attitude toward life. Biology tells us that the mother and father made the fetus—and, therefore, faulty reasoning tells us that they can do what they want with their creation, their property. **But the unborn are both a physical body and a spiritual soul.** Mom and dad made the body, but God made the new soul. So the child is a child of God. In the official <u>Catechism of the Catholic Church</u> (paragraph 366) we see that:

"The Church teaches that every spiritual soul is created immediately by God – it is not "produced" by the parents – and also that it is immortal: it does not perish when it separates from the body at death, and it will be reunited with the body at the final Resurrection."

Therefore, besides stopping a beating heart, abortion prematurely separates an immortal soul from its body, against God's will for that child.

What can we do? The President of the U.S. Catholic Bishops, Bishop William Skylstad, urges: "We must continue to search for helpful and effective means of appreciating the dignity of all of human life. We must find more and better ways of being in greater solidarity with one another on this human journey. Especially, we must look deep into our own hearts to identify those attitudes which are contrary to Jesus' command to love our neighbor as ourselves."

Pray. Lobby and persuade lawmakers. Help mothers contemplating abortion. Help those who aborted their young seek forgiveness and healing. Pray to see how to overcome evil with good—fighting evil with evil only guarantees more evil.




How can women who have had abortions find the forgiveness and healing that Jesus offers to them?

A personal story

My name is Yvonne Florczak-Seeman and I ran away from home at 16 years of age because I became pregnant. Having no other place to go, I was forced to move in with my



boyfriend. Under the constant strain of his physical and mental abuse, I quickly found myself sliding into an inescapable abyss of depression. Realizing the dire state my life was reaching, I arrived at the agonizing decision to terminate the life of my unborn child. I can still vividly remember the visit to the abortion clinic. I remember them telling me continuously that my situation was temporary and that in just a few hours it would all be over. They couldn't have been more wrong. In the three long hours I spent there, I was never advised of what the longterm consequences would be after I left. The true result of that abortion was the complete destruction of my life for the 17 years that followed.

I wish I could say that I learned the proverbial "Lesson" after that experience. However, the reality is that I not only survived that traumatic incident but went on to have four additional pregnancy terminations. Now you may ask how does a person manage to survive such a situation not just once, but five times? The truth is that after the first abortion, my mind had concluded that it was a necessary and reasonable response to my circumstances. The four abortions that followed were merely simple medical procedures. This self-serving scientific designation was created to hide the fact that the first abortion had managed to not only, scrape, rip, and suck out my human tissue but had also succeeded in removing my soul and personal identity.

Looking back now I truly believe that I have been allowed to survive those terribly painful experiences so that I may tell others about the consequences of abortion. It is very clear to me that my life and my experiences are not things to be shrouded in silence and secrecy. ...

It just amazes me to see how many women are finding the strength to break the silence and tell others that abortion is not in the best interest of women; it doesn't protect them, it hurts them!
