

THE PASSING OF POPE JOHN PAUL II — A PERSONAL REMEMBRANCE (continued)



"There is only one true measure of the human spirit, and it is love." That simple but eloquent phrase spoken repeatedly by John Paul II during his pontificate ran through my mind as I awoke to a constant patter of footsteps outside my hotel window on April 8, 2005.

It was just past 5 a.m. on Friday morning in Rome, yet thousands of mourners had already taken to the streets and begun their pilgrimage to St. Peter's Basilica for Pope John Paul II's funeral mass. With boundless determination these dedicated souls battled frigid morning temperatures and government restrictions on automobile transit in downtown Rome to secure a place at the Pope's funeral mass. Arriving from camps set up as far away as 5 miles from the Vatican, row upon row of men, women, and children marched quietly through the streets of Rome toward the home of their beloved Pope.

As I joined the crowd I immediately experienced the solemnity of the occasion. Silent prayer and softly sung devotional hymns had now replaced the joyful singing, dancing, and chanting that had celebrated the life of Pope John II. Rosaries hung from the hands of many mourners. National flags flew under Vatican flags draped in the black of mourning. Friends and families held their love ones tightly to fend off tears, to console.

Standing just outside St. Peter's Square at 11 a.m. I experienced the most dramatic moment of my trip to Rome. Surrounded by thousands of fellow mourners from around the globe, I watched in sadness as the casket of John Paul II reached the outdoor altar of St. Peter's Basilica. This sight evoked a tremendous reaction from the crowd. After a moment of shock and disbelief that left many people kneeling in prayer, a surge of applause ran through the crowd. The applause continued until Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger commenced the holy mass.

The holy mass was a beautiful three-hour celebration of all that Pope John Paul II believed in and professed throughout his pontificate. In his eulogy, Cardinal Ratzinger eloquently described John Paul II's tireless devotion to peace, justice, and human rights.

With heartfelt emotion he spoke of John Paul II's deep sense of spirituality and also of his warm and charismatic sense of friendship. Avoiding the distraction of a strong wing blowing against him, Cardinal Ratzinger beautifully captured the spirit of the moment and elevated the sentiments of the gathered crowd. A crescendo of applause greeted Cardinal Ratzinger's words and by the time he had completed his eulogy chants of "Giovanni Paolo" and "Santo Subito" (Sainthood Now) rang from the crowd.

As the mass came to a close and the casket of John Paul II was slowly carried back inside the Vatican, a final round of applause rang out from the crowd. Tears ran down the cheeks of all those in attendance as a single bell tolled in the background. Seeking consolation for my sense of loss, I looked to the altar where the Princes of the Church, the Cardinals, stood draped in their red vestments. I found comfort in their dedication to the Lord, the Church, and the Catholic ideal of improving the lives of those less fortunate.

I looked to my fellow mourners whose displays of love and affection throughout the last week assured me that the spirit of John Paul II was alive, and I listened for the words of John Paul II, of Jesus Christ- "Be Not Afraid"- each time that sad bell tolled. "Be not afraid" to help those who are less fortunate. "Be not afraid" to love without expectation. "Be not afraid" to accept suffering. "Be not afraid" to accept truth. "Be not afraid" for God is with us, always and everywhere.
